Edgar Munroe Robinson, member of the class of 1901 and former national leader in the Y.M.C.A. boys' work program has made Springfield College his major interest since his retirement from direct leadership. Since 1927 he has made his home in Springfield, was honorary director of the instruction for boys' work when this course was a separate College function. Mr. Robinson particularly has made Springfield College Camp development an object of his interest and aided in its development and attractiveness. Beginning his boys' work administration as secretary of the State Committee of the Y.M.C.A. for Massachusetts and Rhode Island in 1899, Mr. Robinson became Boys Work Secretary of the International Committee of the Y.M.C.A. in 1900 and served in this national capacity for 21 years. He spent the next six years in similar work in Geneva, Switzerland, and at the conclusion of this duty Mr. and Mrs. Robinson came to Springfield and developed their closer friendship and assistance to Springfield College.

EDWARD J. HICKOX

RIGHT . . . Edward J. Hickox, honor graduate, is instantly remembered as the able coach who has consistently developed superior basketball teams at Springfield College. His part in the College, however, is much deeper in the extent to which he has deeply touched the lives of innumerable alumni, both during their student days and after graduation, as friend and confidant. His service to the College has always been gracious and effectively shared as teacher and student counselor by Mrs. Hickox. Prefacing his arrival as a faculty member at Springfield College, Mr. Hickox taught three years at the University of Colorado, served overseas in World War I as an infantry lieutenant, and his great place in the affections of Springfield College starting in 1922 increases steadily notwithstanding his formal retirement in 1939. Mr. and Mrs. Hickox built their own home on the shore of Lake Massasoit near the College at 500 Alden St.

Mr. Tompkins entered into war service immediately after his graduation as honor student of Springfield College in 1918, and in 1919 his Y.M.C.A. career started in Gloversville, New York, as general secretary of that Association. He went to Amsterdam, N. Y. in a similar capacity in 1923 and served there for five years. In 1928 Mr. Tompkins transferred his administrative ability to personnel work for the New York State Y.M.C.A., where he remained for nine years until he was designated for his post of national responsibility. Mr. Tompkins has made the duty of class agent and alumnus of Springfield College an obligation which he has faithfully and constantly discharged for substantial benefit of his Alma Mater.
